2016 Annual Meeting
Ascension Lutheran Church of Navarino
Sunday, January 17, 2016

The Meeting was called to Order by President Darrel Klemp at 10:51 AM, with 39 voting members present.

Pastor Sabin led the group in devotions.

Minutes of the last Annual Meeting were published as part of this Meeting packet. Motion by Arnie Kloes, second by Kay Fuerst, was approved by a voice vote.

Committee Reports – Each Committee report was presented to the Congregation in writing as part of the packet.

Treasurer's /Finance Report – Dennis Fuerst walked the Congregation through the financial reports for the past year. Having no questions, and upon a Motion by Dave Klemp, second by Arnie Kloes, and by a voice vote the report was accepted.

Call Committee Report – Darrel explained that the Congregational Profile has been submitted to the Synod, and the Synod had responded that the Church should increase its budget by \$16,000 - \$20,000 to cover a future Pastors insurance needs. We responded that it was not possible for our Church to do that. Our profile will now be sent to those Pastors that are seeking a call, and then to all NALC Pastors to see who might entertain a call from us.

Old Business – None pending

New Business –

Nomination of 3 Council members for 2 year terms – Dennis Fuerst & John Wudtke (having served 3 consecutive 2 year terms) have decided not to seek re-election. Nominees for this year are Lisa Wollenberg (inc.), Glen Peebles, and George Peters.

Election of Council members – President Darrel asked for additional nominees from the floor 3 times , without response. Upon a Motion by Arnie Kloes, second by Rita Olson, the nominees were elected for 2 year terms.

Selection of Nominating Committee for next year – No volunteers came forth. Rita Olson will continue as Chairperson.

2016 Annual Meeting (continued)
Ascension Lutheran Church of Navarino
Sunday, January 17, 2016

Presentation of the 2016 Budget – Dennis Fuerst presented the budget with a line-by-line review. Also, was a request of the Congregation for the various groups to receive our monthly benevolence funds. The Congregation wishes to fund the following: Martin Luther Congregation, Ascension Agape Fund, NALC Synod support (1/2 to the District, and ½ to the National), Haiti's Children (Gladys Mango), LBT Bible Translators, and International House of Prayer, Safe Haven of Shawano, Loaves & Fishes Food Pantry of Navarino, Don Shires Ministries, Next Step Ministries, Shawano Warming Shelter (SAM 25), ½ to Institute- Lutheran Theology and ½ to "Chaps", and lastly to Habitat for Humanity – Wolf River Chapter. It was also agreed that the Council will decide on a method to fund "scholarships" for the purpose of mission trips and should not affect our benevolence giving. Motion by Glen Peebles, second by Bonnie Weyers, Motion approved.

Approval of 2016 Budget – Motion by Al Meiers, second by Jim Mueller, motion passed.
Property Projects – Narthex & gather room flooring – A rather lengthy discussion ensued on the various product proposed for both area. It was generally agreed that the narthex would be a commercial grade of carpet squares, while the Gathering area would either be LVT (Luxury Vinyl Tile) or an epoxy service. After a chance to look over the products the epoxy surface was chosen. Total cost is estimated by the bids at approximately \$17,500 to complete all the work. A Motion was made for the total cost of the project not to exceed \$20,000 by Glen Peebles, second by Jean Conradt, a voice vote approved the motion.

Appointment of the Good Shepard Home Delegates – appointed were Arnie & Carol Kloes, and Jim & Alice Mueller for 2016.

Other Business – drawings were circulated showing proposal for a new Church sign. This is not a proposed project at this time, and currently anticipated costs are about \$8,000.

Next ANNUAL Meeting will be scheduled by the Council.

The Meeting was closed with the Lord's Prayer.

Upon a Motion by Arnie Kloes, second by Dennis Fuerst, the Meeting adjourned at 1:45 PM.

Interim Pastor's Report 2016

John 6:35-40 Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty. But I said to you that you have seen me and yet do not believe. Everything that the Father gives me will come to me, and anyone who comes to me I will never drive away; for I have come down from heaven, not to do my own will, but the will of him who sent me. And this is the will of him who sent me, that I should lose nothing of all that he has given me, but raise it up on the last day. This is indeed the will of my Father, that all who see the Son and believe in him may have eternal life; and I will raise them up on the last day."

This is the good news of Jesus Christ. He is the true bread that has come down from heaven to give us life. We know that in the Exodus account the Hebrews were brought out of the bondage from Egypt. God provided for their physical needs. Each day they were given Manna from heaven to eat. They were instructed to take only the amount they needed for their family. One could not hoard this food for the next day. It would go moldy and would not be eatable. The Hebrews were to trust in God one day at a time for their physical food. Hebrew means, "Wanderer," in which God's people were named during their time they were enslaved and in the wilderness for 40 years. They became known as Jews once they established their homeland which God had promised.

This is not the bread of heaven that promised eternal life. Jesus said that those who ate the Manna died. It was not the true bread from heaven. Jesus says I AM the true bread which has come down from heaven; those who eat and drink; those who believe and come to him will never be hungry or thirsty.

This true bread which came down from heaven is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Jesus the Anointed One of God, came to us in flesh being like one of us. Through his Passion which led to his crucifixion and resurrection, he gives us his body and blood and he gives us the promise of life in his name. He has given us a new covenant. In the Lord's Supper Jesus takes the simple elements of bread and wine with his divine words of forgiveness. Where there is forgiveness of sin there is eternal life.

This is why the body of Christ comes together to worship; to be nourished at the Lord's Table, to hear the Word proclaimed, to sing songs of praise to our Lord and Savior. Jesus is the true and only bread of heaven. He gives us forgiveness of sin, life and salvation.

Ascension's church facility and grounds continue to be suitable for holding worship, meetings, Christian education, exercise classes, and community outreach events such as Vacation Bible School, Community Dinner and the Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry, just to name a few.

The Sunday morning worship schedule consists of 9:30 am worship. Sunday School for the children and Adult Education classes precede Sunday worship at 8:30 am beginning with Rally Day in September through May. Praise with Passion continues on pre-announced Sunday evenings beginning any time after 5:00 pm with pot-luck food and fellowship followed by a gathering at 6:00 pm for informal, spirit-filled praise and prayer. Many from Ascension have been active with the Wisconsin Via De Cristo movements. Ascension has hosted Via De Cristo Ultreyas (worship) in the past and will most likely plan some for the future as well.

Lenten services were held this past spring from Ash Wednesday through Good Friday. In July, Gladys Mungo of Haiti's Children Incorporated visited Ascension and shared about her mission. Donations from the congregation and community were presented to her for the Haitian communities she serves. Hurricane Matthew devastated parts of Haiti, including the area where Gladys serves, in October. In lieu of holding the annual shoebox drive, Ascension stepped up and held a drive for tarps and other necessary supplies, and was able to donate these items to Gladys and her organization.

In August, Ascension once again hosted a community Vacation Bible School. This year's theme was: Cave Quest: Following Jesus, the Light of the World.

Worship Committee Report 2016 continued

An evening Deer Hunter's worship service, led by Ralph Mueller, was again offered in November in conjunction with the Thanksgiving-themed Community Dinner and a joint Thanksgiving worship service with St. Lawrence Catholic Church and Trinity United Church of Christ is an annual community celebration.

In December, our youth and some adults presented a Christmas Program entitled: "Baby Jesus, We Love You", featuring our Sunday School class as animals and nativity. Thanks to Thrivent for providing goodies for the fellowship time after the program. The church quilters met again multiple times this year and once again sewed beautiful quilts to use for mission purposes. These quilts adorned the backs of the church pews one Sunday during worship and received a blessing before being sold and/or given to a distribution location. And our Christmas Eve services were once again graced with Christ's message of salvation and beautiful Christmas music, including singing 'Silent Night' to candlelight.

We thank the Lord that He has blessed us with the resources (both material resources and people resources!) to provide Spirit-filled and uplifting worship for all.

Youth Report for 2016

Confirmation-Shelly Klemp and Laurie Anderson will stay on as teachers until a pastor is hired and takes over the program. In the spring we taught about the Apostles Creed. We ended confirmation in April. Ryan Mueller was the only youth confirmed in the fall. For the 2016-2017 we are teaching a curriculum called "Bible Studies for Life". This study helps the youth learn more about Jesus and helps teach them how they can be the change in the world by sharing love and grace. This fall we started confirmation with 7 youth. After the first week, we were called and asked if another youth could join our group. Within 2 weeks after we started, 2 more youth joined our group. There is a total of 10 youth in the program this year. The youth are enjoying their time together and are learning how to deepen their relationship with Jesus.

The youth also made pizzas in January to raise money for youth events. In March of 2017, the confirmation youth will be attending the Quake in Wisconsin Dells. This is a weekend of Celebrations, attending workshops, and late night activities.

Sunday School-Sunday school ended on May 1st, 2016. There were games and food planned for that day. Sunday school reconvened September 11th, 2016. There were games, food, pictures, and ice cream. The children introduced themselves to the congregation. Patty, Lois, Angie, and Shelly take turns teaching each week. We are using the same program as last year: Hands-On Bible curriculum. This program works well with all the different age young people. We currently have 11 young people in Sunday school with the help of 2-3 older youth.

Some of the younger youth helped in the food pantry, put up and take down of the tree, and worked at the Golden Age party.

There were eight young people who received Bibles in the fall.

The Christmas program was on December 11th, 2016. Youth from Sunday school and confirmation along with some adults helped to share the Christmas story. Thank you to Toni for taking the time to put the program together. Also, thank you to Heather for helping and all the teachers for giving their time to helping these young people learn about God.

Ascension's buildings and grounds have served us well through 2016. We have a great facility that God has given us to fellowship, worship, learn and even exercise together in. Here is the 'year in review' as it pertains to our congregation's property.

Our annual water test continues to confirm that the well is safe.

The solar electric system continues to serve us well with over 137,200 kWh produced in its lifetime, and roughly 17,300 kWh generated in the last year.

The Loaves and Fishes food pantry continues to do a wonderful job serving our community and occupies the two rooms in the Southeast corner of our building. We are happy to have them as our guest!

Sue Poole, our custodian, continues to keep our facility clean and looking great.

Our lawn and cemetery were maintained by a dedicated group of volunteers again this year. Anyone who would like to help, even for a week or two is certainly welcome! If you would be willing to help out in this ongoing activity, please speak to me. This donation of time helps to reduce our property operating expenses. Many hands make light work and we will have an organizational meeting some time before spring.

Our new lawn equipment storage shed is working very well for us. The concrete approach to the shed and shelving in the shed has been completed in the past year.

New storage shelving was built by John Nelson and has been installed in the southwest corner room of the church.

We had a great turnout for the fall clean-up day and many projects were completed. I really appreciate everyone's participation. We had a lot of fun too!

Projects in progress include new flooring in the narthex and fellowship hall areas as well as updating our church sign. The flooring project fundraising has already raised over \$12,700 of the estimated \$17,500 necessary to complete the job.

Long term goals/needs include resurfacing our parking lot and replacement of the church roof.

To all who have helped maintain, repair and improve our church building and grounds, I extend my sincere thanks. Again this year, a special thank you to Lon Hilliker for his work maintaining the mowing equipment and spraying the weeds. May God continue to bless you all richly.
